DR. GRASSMAN COMES TO NELSPRUIT



JACOB AND THE SME WORKSHOP

Small and Medium Enterprises (SME) have been identified as productive drivers of inclusive economic growth and development in South Africa. Some professional estimate that SME make up to 90% of all formalized businesses, provide employment to about 60% of the labour force and total economic output accounts for roughly 34% of GDP in the country.

Nevertheless, there are a lot of challenges that SME's face, including lack of adequate management skills and skilled labour. Luckily government has placed a huge spotlight on the need for skills and enterprise development and they are actively promoting education and training in this department through its various agencies and institutions.

Seda held a training program on 'Business Development skills for incubators' from across the country and Jacob Mkhabela represented the company. The training program was held at the Protea Hotel at O R Tambo International Airport from 6 - 9 October.

The course was conducted by Seda officials and presentations included 'Acts regulating the small enterprise sector', the 'Economic cycle and its impact on small enterprises' and international small enterprise models. The presentations were done in a relaxed atmosphere and Jacob felt this also gave the nearly 30 incubators time to get to know each other better. After each session the learners were divided into groups for group discussions to make sure everyone understood the facts, and to discuss the session.

Jacob said the course was intimate and thank Seda for a successful and very informative workshop – "I learned that small businesses need to be supported because they play an important role in our economy and in alleviating poverty since they create employment and they also create a platform for skills transfer to the people employed by the small business".



LEARNERSHIPS IN FULL SWING IN BUSCHBUCKRIDGE

MASDT, funded by AgriSETA, is currently training ten farmers based in the Bushbuckridge area of Mpumalanga. The program aims for agricultural education and training of farmers recruited by MASDT, and events kicked off in July 2015 under the watchful eye of contractual facilitator, Fanie Bezuidenhout. One farmer has since retracted but out of the remaining farmers there are still seven women and two men. The course is an Animal Production NQF level 2 Learnership and started off with basic administration skills like proper record keeping as well as effective communication skills. Hands-on training includes subjects like animal nutrition, breeding practices and animal anatomy and morphology. The course runs for 10 months and should conclude in April 2016. This Learnership program offers valuable information to the farmer to lead their businesses effectively and in turn, to educate their employees so that they can have superior knowledge of production and put forth a quality product.

Continuous assessment of the Portfolios are done by the Assessor and will be Moderated at the end of the learning period in April 2016. Competency certificates from AgriSETA will then be issued to the competent learners. The newly acquired knowledge will surely add immense value to the community.







BARLOWORLD TRACTOR TRAINING

If it's one thing that makes MASDT stand out from the rest, it is our hands-on approach through our mobile services. This includes the tractor services which we offer to our clients. Mr William Tsheisi from Barloworld's Head Office came to Nelspruit to conduct an advanced training workshop to our fleet division. The three day workshop was attended by BDO's Thulani Tshobole and Goodwill Mbenyane, IT and Fleet Officer Pieter Jordaan and MASDT mechanic and driver – Johanne Lusenga. Our tractor drivers, who service the different regions in Mpumalanga, also attended. They are Timothy Sekgobela from the Piring area, Elliot Nyalunga from Mkhuhlu and our two Buffelspruit drivers – Philemon Sithole and Dumisani Manikela.

The training was conducted in sessions over three days on one of our SCV tobacco farms in Buffelspruit and Pieter said it was extremely interesting to learn about the mechanics of tractors. The workshop delved into the various aspects of tractor maintenance and safety. Some of the subjects covered the basics like the correct way to idle, drive and maintain a tractor to a more advanced lesson in how to hook a carrier the correct way, and identifying implement parts.

The fleet team said they gained valuable information, and they feel it will benefit the quality of the tractor service which will in turn benefit the client.

SUCCESS STORY:
Ngogolo Chicken Farm



Thobani Lubisi is a young man who has what it takes to be a young entrepreneur. Drive and ambition is one and he started a chicken farm and piggery on 3.5ha land that he named Ngogolo Farm in the heart of the Nkomazi region of Mpumalanga in 2009.

He is a hard worker and though him and his wife – Nomaswati - physically worked the farm and made a living, they only survived. What Thobani wanted to do was thrive.

Ngogolo was incorporated into MASDT's incubation program in 2013. After close consultation with the client it was established that what Ngogolo needed was a better market for their product and, because they wanted to farm on a larger scale – more equipment, machinery and infrastructure.

Then BDO Inocent Makuwaza took the project under his wing and while Ngogolo was receiving technical training and priceless information in all the aspects of animal production, our Procurement Officer – Chris Botha was sourcing better quality feed for the animals from Rossgro.

Rossgro not only gave them feed of superior quality, but also through MASDT's connection, gave it to them at discounted prices. The business therefore reduced its production costs which improved their profit margins. It was during this time that Zanele Mbokazi joined Thobani and Nomaswati. She is a young Animal Scientist who was qualified in Animal Production, freshly graduated, and she was employed as farm manager.

Gallito's was impressed by the quality of the meat and today the farm delivers up to 1 500 chickens to the Nelspruit outlet. Ngogolo is now a fully fledged chicken farm – with the pigs been done away with, except for a huge boar and his sow which are regarded more as pets today.

The chickens are in great condition in their aerated houses and under close supervision from Zanele and her staff. The farm has made a turnover of almost R700 000.00 in the three years during incubation.

Inocent has since been promoted to Business Development Manager and new recruit – Thulani Thsobole has taken over the project. He says the farm is running so smoothly that only bi-monthly visits are done to make sure that the clients do not need anything.

Ngogolo Chicken Farm has certainly come a long way and when they are set to graduate in 2016, MASDT can with confidence say that this fledgling has turned into a soaring eagle that has earned its right to be in our hall of fame of success stories.
